The year 2004 was highlighted by the presentation of three Eagle Scout badges and by an exciting high adventure trip to Colorado.



The annual cross country ski trip to the White Mountains of New Hampshire and a weekend trip to cabins at Camp Mattauck kept our Scouts active in the cold weather. **February...**A hearty group of ice fisherman had a successful day on the ice on a private pond in Massachussetts. ♦ Good snow provided an ideal atmosphere for the Klondike Derby. **March...** Our new members were challenged by a 5-mile hike on the Jericho and Mattatuck Trails. ♦ The troop shot 22-caliber rifles at a Naugatuck shooting range. ♦ Later in the month we camped at Camp Mattatuck. ◆Bill M.

assembled a group of volunteers who painted the Our Lady of Lorretto Church hall. ◆Scouting's highest rank, Eagle Scout, was awarded to Marc B. April...Steep Rock Reservation provided an ideal setting for a low-impact camping trip. ♦ The Scouts visited an indoor climbing facility. May...To qualify for Eagle Scout Ian S. led the troop in the design and building of a frisbee golf course at YMCA Camp Mataucha. ♦ We took part in what turned out to be the last Blue Trail District Camporee, held at White Memorial Foundation. Orienteering was the theme. During the summer a re-alignment of districts saw Blue Trail District disband, and Watertown and Middlebury joined the former Mattatuck District to form the new "Mad River" District. ♦ Cory S. and Matthew B. received their Eagle Scout awards. ♦ Thomas D. designed and built a 15'x8' American Flag made of flowers for the lawn adjacent to the gazebo on Academy Hill. This was Tom's Eagle Scout Community Service Project. ♦ The troop had a strong turnout of marchers for the Memorial Day Parade. June...Our high adventure Scouts paddled the Housatonic River and backpacked the

Appalachian Trail. July... Two high adventure crews went out on the trail. One crew traveled to Packard High Adventure Base in Pueblo, Colorado for white water rafting and hiking. They reached the summit of a 14,000-foot peak! The other crew took a rugged 3-day hike on the Appalachian Trail in Connecticut and Massachussetts.

Justin M. worked on the waterfront staff at Camp Mattatuck the entire summer. The troop committee led a group of adult leaders in erecting a playscape at Veterans' Park. August... The troop returned to Camp Mattatuck for a week of good Scout camping. **September...** We participated in the Merit Badge Weekend at

November.... ◆An early snowstorm made the hiking at Sleeping Giant Park more interesting. ◆ A "penny war" competition raised funds for Christmas toys donated to needy children in town. ♦ Our "Iron Chef" campout at Sessions Woods in Burlington saw the Scouts cook tasty meals like roast pork loin, meat loaf, stuffed peppers, acorn squash with apples and cinnamon and other delicacies. ◆ Mike J. supervised the planting of several shade trees at Bethlehem Fairgrounds as part of his Eagle Scout Community Service Project. **December...**A small crew of Scouts camped at White Memorial Foundation to practice skills to qualify for the Low Impact Camping Award and Camping Merit Badge. ◆The following week the rest of the troop camped at Camp Mattatuck.
